... Pointing People toward Christ

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"Jesus asked her, 'Why are you weeping, and whom are you seeking?'" (John 20:15). On that first Easter morning, Mary Magdalene had just encountered the Risen Lord. However, she did not recognize Jesus, as she was still blinded by mourning His horrifying, unjust death.

In this season, preachers often compare the beauty and joy we find in the rebirth of Nature to the wonders of new life in Christ, granted to us through the miracle of His Resurrection. But this spring, southeastern Pennsylvania doesn't look much like spring right now. Few flowers are blooming, and newly green grass is rare. As of Palm Sunday, a week ago, there were still ragged piles of dirty snow along our roads, mud in our fields, bare branches, and low temperatures below freezing And it's really dragging us down.

After slogging through forty days of penitential selfexamination, prayer, fasting, and charitable works (most of which, likely, we never got around to), we need those brightly-colored symbols of revival and renewal to soothe our wounded lives.

Why are *we* weeping, and whom do *we* seek? Like Mary Magdalene, our pain is real, our sorrow deep, and temptation is still too close at hand. Yet, Jesus is even closer.



But, like Mary, we may not be able to see the Lord because we are still too focused on our griefs. (We cannot even cheer ourselves with burgeoning tulips.) And this is a good thing. Because what we need isn't spring — as lovely and uplifting as it can be — what we need is the Risen Lord, who is there for us 365 days a year, 24/7, to redeem, restore, and revive us.

That is the great good news of Easter! Jesus Christ was raised from the dead so that He could be with us always – comforting, guiding, healing, and protecting us through His Holy Spirit that has been given to us (2 Cor. 1:21).

As St. Paul writes in Romans 5:5, "this hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured out into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us." Alleluia, *indeed*!

Yes, we need spring in all its glory. But even more, we need Jesus in all *His* glory. I pray that this Easter, Our Lord will be very present to you in His love, breathing new life and joy into your soul — and that you will


share those blessings with others.


Anyone is welcome to attend either the evening or afternoon class on any given week—you don't have to stick with one or the other, if your schedule does not permit.

Sunday, April 22 is "Bring a Friend Sunday" at St. John's Church. That means, every member should invite to church at least one friend, neighbor, or even a family member who does not attend another church. Why?

Church growth expert Win Arn writes, "We've asked more than 50,000 people over the last 10 years why they came to church, and between **75 and 90 percent of respondents say,**



"I began attending because someone invited me."

In researching how people come to church, Arn reported these statistics:

- 2% by Advertisement
- 6% by the Pastoral Invitation
- 6% by organized evangelism campaign
- 86% by friends or relatives

If you have a heart for growing our parish for Christ, *reach out and invite a friend*. But most important, *pray for that person* before *and* after you extend the invitation. After all, it's God who brings people to church—we can only ask them to come.

Join us at St. John's on Thursday, May 3rd at 7:00 pm for our second annual National Day of Prayer Service.

The National Day of Prayer is an annual observance held on the first Thursday of May, inviting people of all faiths to pray for our Nation. It was created in 1952 by a joint resolution of the United States Congress and signed into law by President Harry S. Truman.

The annual observance represents a Judeo-Christian expression of an understanding that our country was birthed in prayer and in reverence for the God of the Bible. Worship services all across America offer an opportunity for every citizen to intercede for our national and local community leaders and their families.

This year's emphasis is on prayer for unity within our diversity. The Scripture verse is Ephesians 4:3, "making every effort to keep the unity of the spirit through the bond of peace."

For 2018, St. John's Outreach Committee has elected to support the following ministries:

Bridge of Hope at Good Samaritan

Services. Good Samaritan Services is based on Christian principles—Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan teaches us to love our neighbors through caring for their physical and emotional needs and helping them get back on their feet. As such, Good Sam provides safe, comfortable housing for individuals and families experiencing homelessness in Lancaster and Chester Counties. In 2017 Bridge of Hope joined them because both organizations share the same goals and can now serve both counties.

We will be giving financial donations and gifts in kind:

- May 13th Collection of gift • cards for Mother's Day.
- November Collection of gift cards for the mothers for the holiday season.

Octorara Area Food Cupboard.

Located in Parkesburg, the OAFC serves clients in Atglen, Christiana, Cochranville, Compass, Parkesburg, Pomeroy, Sadsbury, and Wagontown. OAFC is supported by local businesses, churches, schools, civic groups and individuals, has its own 501c3 and also works the Chester County Food Bank.

Steeple to People.

Beginning in 1982 as a faith-based ministry, STP is located in Honey Brook and services clients in the area. It operates a thrift store, and funds from the store are used to support their other ministries, including a short-term refugee house, a youth center, and a food bank.

November – Once again, we will • again be collecting Thanksgiving dinners for STP.

Eye Glasses for the Lions' Club. They



collect used eyeglasses and deliver them to regional Lions' Eyeglass Recycling Centers, where volunteers

clean, sort by prescription strength, and package the glasses. Recycled glasses are distributed to people in need in low and middle-income communities for the greatest impact.

Now through September -We're collecting eyeglasses, sunglasses, loose lenses and even broken glasses for this program. See the designated box near the Sanctuary stairs.

From the Outreach Budget, other organizations to whom we will be donating financial assistance include:

City Gates – Located in Coatesville, their mission is to help homeless men with shelter and meals. They also meet with prisoners on a Christian basis.

Parkesburg Point – This is a Christian Youth Center located in Parkesburg, that features programs such as Homework Club and Computer Center, to help students excel academically; a basketball team to help teach commitment and



teamwork; Bible Studies; and Christian camps.

The Seamen's Church Institute of

Philadelphia – This ministry of the Diocese of Pennsylvania in the ports of Philadelphia



and New Jersey assists the merchant mariners at the terminals along the Delaware River. As these seafarers are at sea for months, they need help contacting family, shopping, and chaplaincy support if there are problems aboard ships.

Good Works – Based in Coatesville, this Christian nonprofit organization exists to improve the living conditions for low-income families in Chester County. They have volunteers who work on houses at no cost. Most of the homeowners they assist are elderly, single parents, and individuals with physical disabilities.



Advoz – Located in Lancaster City, this organization equips local residents to constructively handle conflicts, violence, and crime. With more than 30 years of experience serving approximately 750 residents, businesses, and organizations annually, Advoz facilitates communication, accountability, and mindfulness, empowering all parties in a conflict or crime-even offenders and victims—to mend broken relationships. They are building stronger, safer communities, by facilitating peaceful resolution and healing for youth and adults who have been harmed by violence or crime.
