The Episcopal Church's 79th General Convention convened in Austin, Texas, July 5-13. This triennial event brings laypersons, deacons, priests, and bishops together to determine the future



direction for the Church.

According to the Episcopal News Service, members of the House of

Deputies and the House of Bishops set a new record for resolutions while also passing a \$134 million budget focused on the priorities laid out by our Presiding Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Michael Curry.

The Episcopal Church in Cuba was readmitted to "the family." There were resolutions focused on the environment, racial reconciliation, immigration, and a response to gun violence. In the wake of the #metoo movement, the bishops confessed the church's participation in sexual harassment. Delegates also pledged a renewed commitment to evangelism.

Evangelism is basically the common vision to which Bishop Daniel Gutiérrez has called the

Diocese of Pennsylvania: "To know Jesus and change the world."

The passage of A227 calls for the establishment of a Task Force on "Communion Across Differences" (equally staffed by traditionalists and progressives), tasked with finding ways for both traditionalists and progressives to work together, to the extent possible, with a sense of integrity in The Episcopal Church.

Resolution A068 preserved the 1979 BCP marriage rite and preamble: the current psalter and liturgies; the Trinitarian formularies; the Lambeth Quadrilateral; and the Historic Documents. However, the resolution does allow for Dioceses under the direction and approval of their Bishop, to develop new rites and new language for trial use. Meanwhile, Episcopal congregations are permitted to use versions of the current Eucharistic prayers that embrace "expansive language" to characterize humanity and God.

The Anglican/Episcopal Communion includes over 80 million Christians who are members of 45 different Churches, 39 of which are member churches (also called Provinces) and 6 other national or local churches known as Extra Provincials, spread across the globe in over 165 countries. The Episcopal Church is not defined by confessional faith statements (beyond the Nicene, Apostle's, and Athanasian Creeds). Rather, we are unified through our faith in Jesus Christ and Holy Scripture, and our shared use of *The Book of Common Prayer* (itself a repository of faith over the centuries).




Historically, the "Four Instruments of Communion" for all Anglicans have been: 1) The Archbishop of Canterbury (and his leadership); 2) The Lambeth Conference (a worldwide conference of bishops that takes place every 10 years); 3) The Anglican Consultative Council (comprised of laity and clergy, meets every 3 years and seeks to serve the needs of member churches; 4) The Primates' Meeting (chaired by the Archbishop of Canterbury, a meeting of the chief Archbishops, Presiding Bishops, Moderators and chief pastors of the 39 provinces gather for "thought, prayer, and consultation").

Please remember to pray for our Church, — which is always first and foremost, the Church of Jesus Christ, not us.

troubled by a strained relationship, a chronic illness, the death
of a loved one, a difficult marriage, depression, an addiction, a
past abuse—or even a combination of these."

She suggests, "perhaps instead of asking 'why' we should be asking 'who" as we turn to *God who* speaks to us through our affliction, using our thorns to draw us closer to Him.

For the past year, at the request of the Vestry, our Organist, Rick Hacker, has been searching for the right new instrument for St. John's Church.

He tried out several models from manufacturers **Allen** (in Dallastown) and **Rodgers** (in Ephrata), settling on one from each that would be appropriate. Both organs are comparable in cost and features, with differing options for customer service. Rick shared the proposals with the Vestry for their review and consideration.

At the September meeting, the Vestry authorized Rick to move forward in negotiations with Rodgers for their Inspire Series 233 model (shown below).



As of August 2018, the Organ Fund was at \$22,595. We will need approximately \$11,000 more to complete the purchase. Donations large and small are welcome!




The Lunch Bunch will meet again on Thursday, October 25 at 11:30 am, at the Country Squire Restaurant in New Holland.

St. John's Outreach Team wishes to thank everyone who so generously donated used eyeglasses during the spring and summer months. We had an enormous collection which Debbie Martin took to our local Lions' Club's "Recycling for Sight" Program.

Throughout the year, Lions, Leos and other volunteers collect used eyeglasses and deliver them to regional Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centers (LERCs). LERC volunteers clean, sort by prescription strength and package the glasses. Recycled glasses are distributed to needy people in low- and middle-income communities where they will have the greatest impact.

On July 22, we enjoyed our second Picnic Sunday at the Garden Spot Pavilion, and we thank Mary Lou & Paul Weaver for reserving it for us again in 2019. (Unfortunately, we did not take any photos in 2018.)



At least 10 members of St. John's Church have signed up for CPR Training and instructions for using our **AED machine**. An automated external defibrillator (AED) is a portable electronic device that automatically diagnoses the life-threatening cardiac arrhythmias of ventricular fibrillation and pulseless ventricular tachycardia. It is able to treat these through defibrillation—the application of electricity which stops the arrhythmia, allowing the heart to reestablish an effective rhythm.

With simple audio and visual commands, AEDs are designed to be easy to use by laypersons, and the use of AEDs is taught in many first aid and basic life support-level CPR classes.

Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) is an emergency procedure that combines chest compressions, sometimes with artificial ventilation, in an effort to manually preserve intact brain function until further measures are taken to restore spontaneous blood circulation and breathing in a person who is in cardiac arrest.
